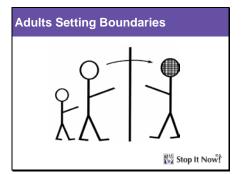

The Scope of Sex Abuse In 4 women reports having been sexually abused as a child In 6 men reports having been sexually abused as a child In up to 50% of cases, child sexual abuse is committed by semeone younger than 18 (child-to-child sexual abuse) Up to 90% of child sexual abuse cases are perpetrated by semeone the child sexual abuse as a child sexual abuse. The Facts

All sexual activity between an adult and a child is sexual abuse. Sexual abuse does not have to involve penetration, force, pain, or even touching. If an adult engages in any sexual behavior (looking, showing, or touching) with a child to meet the adult's interest or sexual needs, it is sexual abuse.

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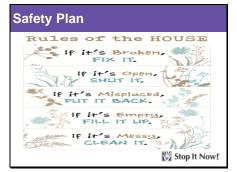
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A note about children's sexual behaviors...

- Sexual touching between children can also be harmful, and in some cases abusive.
- Sexual abuse between children is often defined as when there is a significant age difference (usually 3 or more years) between the children, or if the children are very different developmentally or size-wise.

Sexual Development Infancy and Toddlerhood

- Curious and explore their own and others bodies (including genitals)
 Self-soothing thru self-stimulation
- Experience erections/vaginal lubrication

- Appendice elections/vaginal lubrication
 Talk openly about their bodies; enjoys nudity
 Identify as male or female and recognize the
 difference between boys and girls
 Able to say the appropriate names for body
 parts (head, nose, stomach, penis, vulva,
 etc.)

Prevention Tasks: Infants and Toddlers

- Teaching language for all body parts, including genitals
- Allow child to explore own body; do not shame them for being curious
- Responding to questions about sexuality honestly but simply
- · Healthy physical contact
- Provide warm, safe and loving environment
- · Allow them to say no to hugs, kisses, etc.

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Healthy Touch

- Everyone needs to be touched!
- Healthy touch prevents sexual abuse
- How to provide healthy touch
- · Teaches consent
- · What do you need?

Sexual Development Three to Five

- · Touch their genitals for pleasure
- Questions, Questions
- Role exploration and play
- Become conscious of their own body

Prevention Tasks: Three to Five

- Teach and model privacy, respect, healthy boundaries
- Talk about "ok" and "Not ok" touches
- Provide age-appropriate sexuality education
- Encourage self-care
- Answer questions honestly and directly
- · Teach and model consent

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Talking about Consent



- Minors cannot give informed consent
- Respect their physical boundaries
- Teach respect for other's physical boundaries
- Verbal and body language skills
- Model!

Sexual Development Six to Eight

- Continue sexual play and genital stimulation
- · Prefer friends of their own gender
- Affectionate behavior with peers
 Recognize the taboos surrounding sexuality, and may not ask as many questions
 Begin to conform with style, dress and
- speech of peers
- Engage in name-calling and teasing
 Have a stronger self-concept in terms of gender and body image

Prevention Tasks: Six to Eight

- Provide age-appropriate information about sexuality
- Utilize media, books, situational opportunities to discuss sexual matters
- Model healthy and respectful boundaries
- · Reinforce family safety planning rules

- · Using safety planning

Sexual Development Nine to Twelve

- Enter puberty, especially girls
 Become more modest and private
 Have romantic crushes on friends, older teens, TV stars or teachers
- Continue to have mostly same gender friends
- Feel concerns about being normal
 Face decision-making about sexual activity
- Feel shy about asking questions of caregivers, especially regarding sexuality, and may act like they already know all the answers
- Seeks out sexuality information from the internet and other media sources

Prevention Tasks: Nine to Twelve

- · Provide broad-based sexual health education
- Discuss and help develop problem solving, decision-making, and communication skills
- · Develop own media literacy skills, and stay informed about child's cyber activities - discuss internet safety
- · Discuss and model family values
- Promote healthy relationships



Sexual Development Adolescents

- · Self-conscious and self-secure
- Parental/authority relationships often intense and full of conflict
- · Pressured to become sexual
- Questioning family values and beliefs
- Advanced sexual behavior, matters and relationships explored
- · Practical dating matters

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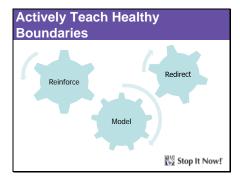

Prevention Tasks: Adolescents

- Will need information and have questions about
 - Decision making
 - Social relationships and sexual customs
- Personal values and consequences of sexual behavior
- Encourage them to think for themselves
- Stay involved and engaged!
- Ask what they think



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Talking with Children and Teens

- Validate questions
- Provide accurate and honest information
- Find our what they know and have experienced
- Talk about child's own behaviors
- Talk about values, consent and being a responsible bystander

 Identify safe people and place
- "Secrets" vs. Surprises
- Use examples, media, real-life
- Model, Model, Model
